Message From the Principal

A wonderful little proverb states very simply: "Learn a new language, and gain a new soul."

As a young missionary in St. Petersburg, Russia – I learned to communicate and empathize with a people who were marked by a deep sense of conflict and human endurance.² Although difficult to explain to someone who has never spoken more than one language, in learning to speak Russian, I eventually added a certain "Russian soul" to my own.

Language, broadly defined, is any system, faculty, or power employed to communicate ideas or thoughts. Thus, music is often referred to as a language.³ So is mathematics. And so is art, and logic, and dance, and so forth. In the mastery of these and other disciplined "languages", a new soul is gained. In the language of holy writ, mastery of the divine discipline even conveys a "new heart."

As a young lawyer with a little background in musical composition, I experienced one of those unexpected watershed moments when one of my personal mentors in law school, Professor Scharffs, leveraged the language of music to shatter my shortsighted view of the discipline of advocacy.⁵

He began by recounting an experience shared by President Hinckley in 1988 (who was at the time First Counselor in the First Presidency of the Church). In the words of President Hinckley:

We live in an environment where there is much of litigation and conflict, of suing and countersuing. Even here the powers of healing may be invoked. As a young man I worked with Elder Stephen L. Richards, then of the Council of the Twelve. When he came into the First Presidency of the Church, he asked me to assist him with a very delicate and sensitive matter. It was fraught with most grave and serious consequences. After listening to him discuss it, I said, "President Richards, you don't want

me; you want a lawyer." He said, "I am a lawyer. I don't want to litigate this. I want to compose it."

Professor Scharffs seized upon the word "compose" and proceeded to conduct one of the most beautiful and profound word studies I have ever encountered. What caught me most by surprise is that he employed the language of *musical composition* to examine the critical character traits that every good *lawyer* should possess in "composing" conflict, "especially if we are to transcend the role of hired gun or mercenary and realize our potential as healers and unifiers."

Professor Scharffs then drew upon words like "dissonance" and "resolution", "harmony and counterpoint", "tension" between "major and minor keys", "crescendo" and "decrescendo". In summation, he concluded that "a true musical masterpiece includes all of these elements in a grand and delicate balance".

I was stunned. Suddenly I was not just hearing another lecture on what it meant to be a good lawyer – I was *feeling* it. He was speaking to one of my other souls. It was as if Bach's Brandenburg Concertos were expanding my view of the proper role of government!

A Season for Composing Conflict

During the Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons, I often reflect with admiration upon those who so ably "compose" the uncertainty and conflict of their lives long enough to access the divine glimpse of perspective necessary to make their ongoing burdens lighter.⁸

In this spirit, I am reminded of the two great Presidential Thanksgiving Proclamations, delivered in brief moments of respite just following the great American Revolution and also during the great American Civil War.

On October 3, 1789, the first President of the United States issued the following proclamation to a new nation that had found temporary calm in the wake of its first great military, economic, and constitutional conflict:



"By the President of the United States of America, a Proclamation:


Whereas it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor – and whereas both Houses of Congress have by their joint Committee requested me to recommend to the People of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness.

Now therefore I do recommend and assign Thursday the 26th day of November next to be devoted by the People of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be – That we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks - for his kind care and protection of the People of this Country previous to their becoming a Nation – for the signal and manifold mercies, and the favorable interpositions of his Providence which we experienced in the course and conclusion of the late war – for the great degree of tranquility, union, and plenty, which we have since enjoyed - for the peaceable and rational manner, in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national One now lately instituted - for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed; and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and in general for all the great and various favors which he hath been pleased to confer upon us.

And also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations and beseech him to pardon our national and other transgressions – to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually - to render our national government a blessing to all the people, by constantly being a Government of wise, just, and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed--to protect and guide all Sovereigns and Nations (especially such as have shewn kindness unto us) and to bless them with good government, peace, and concord – To promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us - and generally to grant unto all Mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as he alone knows to be best.

Given under my hand at the City of New York the third day of October in the year of our Lord 1789. [signed, G. Washington]⁹

On exactly the same day, 74 years later (October 3, 1863), President Abraham Lincoln issued another powerful Thanksgiving Proclamation addressed to an America in crisis:

"By the President of the United States of America, a Proclamation.

The year that is drawing towards its close, has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added, which are of so extraordinary a nature, that they cannot fail to penetrate and soften even the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever watchful providence of Almighty God.

In the midst of a civil war of unequaled magnitude and severity, which has sometimes seemed to foreign States to invite and to provoke their aggression, peace has been preserved with all nations, order has been maintained, the laws have been respected and obeyed, and harmony has prevailed everywhere except in the theatre of military conflict; while that theatre has been greatly contracted by the advancing armies and navies of the Union. Needful diversions of wealth and of strength from the fields of peaceful industry to the national defence, have not arrested the plough, the shuttle or the ship; the axe has enlarged the borders of our settlements, and the mines, as well of iron and coal as of the precious metals, have yielded even more abundantly than heretofore. Population has steadily increased, notwithstanding the waste that has been made in the camp, the siege and the battle-field; and the country, rejoicing in the consciousness of augmented strength and vigor, is permitted to expect continuance of years with large increase of freedom.



No human counsel hath devised nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who, while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy. It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American People. I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens.

And I recommend to them that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and

disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility and Union.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, this Third day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and of the Independence of the Unites States the Eighty-eighth. By the President: [signed Abraham Lincoln]¹⁰



In these two proclamations we find a divine breath of hope in the face of uncertainty – that in "remembering the source from which our blessings come" - the greatest of all Composers will remember mercy in "composing conflict" for our good.

May we also speak the language of gratitude in our classrooms and homes and always "acknowledge with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God."12

The Parable of the Lord and the Fortress (by Erik Heras, 10th Grade)

There once was a town atop a large knoll. In the center was a fortress - tall, mighty, and built of the sturdiest stone. One day, the lord of the town and of the fortress within sent out a decree. He promised to the townsfolk, whom he loved, security; that if there were to be any siege by enemies, those who had done their duties might flee and be admitted into the cover of the impregnable stronghold. "I will give defense to my subjects, but only to them who have remained faithful to me and have done their part in my town. This I promise you."

Many did not consent. Some believed and asserted that the enemy, if there really was any, would never attack and therefore did not submit to his plan. Some felt the lord's help was unreliable and they themselves had far better solutions; they assumed that they could easily elude the enemy and retreat into the wilderness. Some believed that the lord would provide them with protection even if their duties went undone. Some believed many other erroneous ideas. The rest agreed to do what was asked of them and believed that they were in good hands. As time passed, the lord kept watch over his people. Not a single action or neglect went unknown to him. He frequently implored his people to stay faithful and true, and to be ready.

At least one source indicates this is a Czech proverb, but I suspect that there is a similar proverb in every language! ² The Russian word for patience, often used in context of endurance, is "terpenyeh". The Russians and their Slavic descendants have endured more protracted national warfare than



This is another historic year for the School as we begin major construction to expand and improve the School's facilities from kindergarten through high school. There will be heavy equipment, piles of construction materials, some occasional background noise, and lots of dust.

Of course, all of this might strike us as inconvenient – and we might expect to see signs such as "PLEASE PARDON THE DUST!" But in honor of those who have sacrificed more than we comprehend to make these improved facilities possible - we have decided instead to post signs that read "PLEASE <u>BE GRATEFUL</u> FOR THE DUST!"... and we will rededicate our efforts as an entire school community (including students) to act as more grateful stewards of our beautiful campus, beginning with an opening all-school assembly on the topic of Christian Stewardship and continuing through the year with activities focused on preserving our building for future generations to come.



Our fundraising efforts for the building expansion have been admirable: we have raised approximately \$2.2 million in the last year since we began our building expansion campaign, but we have not yet achieved our \$4 million goal. We need everyone's help! Since we do not include capital improvement costs in tuition, the tuition paid by families at the school represents approximately half of the "real" cost of per-student education at the school (factoring in the would-be costs for building, land, facilities, furniture, fixtures and equipment).

Thus, as we honor the sacrifice that all families are making to pay tuition at the school, we will also continue to invite each other, and the larger community, to give to our annual campaign as we are reminded that we all "drink from wells that we have not dug."

On November 6, Natalie Clein, a renowned international cellist, made a special visit to the American Heritage Lyceum Philharmonic at American Heritage School.


As a special guest performer for the Utah Symphony, Ms.
