Whatever it was, my heart was filled to overflowing one recent morning as I stood at the back door greeting students. My third-grade son approached me with the usual sack lunch that he makes for me each morning. "Love you, Dad"- he said as he handed me the lunch sack, gave me a quick hug, and started off down the hallway to class. He was late arriving that morning, and was alone in the hall. From behind, I watched his oversized backpack tugging on his shoulders, his extra-sized shoes catching the floor, and his lanky elbows jutting out from both sides as he hitched his thumbs in his shoulder straps. The bell had just rung and he was obviously in no particular hurry. I almost called after him to rush him along, but stopped myself as I realized that he was scanning the "wall of the prophets," one portrait at a time, as if he were seeing them for the first time. A lump welled in my throat. I watched him until he disappeared around the corner, my eyes now brimming to match my heart. I beheld in that holy instant "an heritage of the Lord"² and realized more fully the urgency of teaching the rising generation not just to know with their minds. but to *feel* with their hearts, as an "anchor unto their soul" in the "times of the storm" that will surely come for each of them.

The Intersection of Sacred and Secular Maps

American Heritage School has come to a defining point in its history when the school community is, in many respects, a microcosm not just of Utah County, or Utah, or the United States of America – but of a worldwide family from unique backgrounds and cultures, unified in their conviction that the best education is as much a matter of the heart as it is the mind.




American Heritage School's inaugural graduating class of 2010-2011 represents 21 students from five countries.

The distance education program, for example, currently has students enrolled from 12 states and Canada, and is growing at a surprising rate. The international student program represents students from six countries and five continents. Our inaugural graduating high school class is comprised of some of the most brilliant and outstanding youth that I have known, many with standardized test scores and high school transcripts that will appeal to most any university in the country. The school's full accreditation visit in February 2011 will draw talented and experienced educators and administrators from across the Intermountain West and Pacific Northwest. In these and various other ways, we are seeing a literal fulfillment of the strategic vision of the school to "be an effective resource for parents worldwide in assisting children and families to maximize their divine potential."5

With such rapid growth and innovation comes the critical responsibility for us to stay focused on core and changeless principles – the great "vine" upon which our branches must continue to draw strength. American Heritage School's roots are deep, and extend not just to 1970 when the school opened its

doors at the Pleasant Grove campus, but to 1876, with a commission from Brigham Young to Karl G. Maeser (see a timeline of American Heritage School's history at the following link: http://american-heritage.org/timeline.htm).

Much like BYU, Notre Dame, Yeshiva, Hillsdale, SVU, Stonebridge, and other institutions that approach secular subjects through a sacred lens, we all agree that our faith is no excuse for academic mediocrity – and we all pursue academic excellence with a mission-driven zeal. None of us want our children to be taught in an environment that takes a dogmatic approach of "God said so" and gives up on a careful and honest pursuit of truth. But neither do we desire the agnostic approach of "thou shalt not believe without coercive, sensible evidence," which, as William James so aptly put it, "is simply an expression of a private, personal appetite for evidence of a certain peculiar kind."



The Jewish author Chaim Potok, whose books appeal to a wide and diverse audience for their engaging illustration of the unavoidable intersection between sacred and secular thought systems, once described the difference between scholars in the two systems:

The scholar in a sacred system "assumes there is a design and purpose to nature," because God's spirit "hovers over all creation," giving divine origins to the premises of the sacred system. Thus, even the most sophisticated scholar in a sacred system faithfully transmits "inherited old and acceptable new scholarship" while respecting the established "boundaries of the system" according to a "predetermined choreography." By contrast, the scholar in a secular system always probes and challenges the system's boundaries. believing that all premises originate with human beings, the exclusive focus of secular systems. In secular systems, "it is man who gives, and man who takes away."8

Potok went on to describe "a boiling cauldron of colliding ideas and world views" that makes cultural confrontation between sacred and secular systems unavoidable. He then suggested four possible approaches for the religious person who faces such confrontation:

First, the lockout approach: one can simply dodge the conflict by erecting impenetrable barriers between the sacred and the secular and then remaining in just one system. Second, compartmentalization: one creates separate categories of thought that coexist in a "tenuous peace." Third, take down all walls and allow complete fusion in which the sacred and secular cultures freely feed each other, perhaps leading to a "radically new seminal culture." And fourth, ambiguity: take down most if not all walls and accept a multitude of questions without intending to resolve them.

At American Heritage School, we reject the first three approaches, and the fourth (accepting ambiguity) still leaves the faithful and the agnostic alike, at some level, to yearn for more. In reflecting upon Potok's four approaches, Bruce Hafen, then Provost of BYU, and future dean of the BYU Law School, rejected the first three approaches as well, acknowledged the need for the fourth under some circumstances, and proposed a fifth approach for integrating sacred and secular thought systems. His recommendation is born of a perspective provided by the restored gospel of Jesus Christ, what he described as "the most comprehensive explanation of life and of the cosmos available to humankind."¹⁰ The idea, drawn from the interchange between Alma and Korihor in the Book of Mormon, was developed in an essay by Terry Warner entitled "On Having Faith and Thinking for Yourself",11:

The main difference between Alma's map of the universe and Korihor's map is that Alma's map is broader. If Alma's map is represented by a ten-by-ten-foot square, Korihor's map is a four-by-four-foot square within Alma's larger square. Alma doesn't have the answer to every question, but he does see and accept the same scientific evidence that Korihor does. Beyond that, Alma also recognizes evidence of personal meaning and spiritual reality that Korihor's map by definition excludes... Not that these [secular] limits are all bad: we really don't want science or the government to tell us the ultimate meaning of our lives—we make those choices personally, based upon evidence available outside the limited scientific sphere. Thus we integrate a secular map into the broader sacred map, but our sacred system cannot be made to fit within the smaller secular map.¹²



American Heritage School's motto is "Educating Hearts and Minds"

American Heritage School is, emphatically, a place where "great theology and great scholarship are not only compatible, but mutually and limitlessly illuminating." In the words of one modern day prophet: "In this gospel view there is no room for a contracted, narrow, or prejudicial view... We believe there is a spiritual influence that emanates from the presence of God to fill the immensity of space. (See D&C 88:12.) All men share an inheritance of divine light. God operates among his children in all nations, and those who seek God are entitled to further light and knowledge, regardless of their race, nationality, or cultural traditions." ¹⁴

To the new families and students who have joined our ranks, we welcome you with our "hearts and minds." To the "legacy" families who have had your hand to the plow at American Heritage for many years, we honor you, and would not be who we are today without you.

The Lord requires our hearts, and our willing minds. May we all recognize our personal responsibility to preserve and maintain this truly extraordinary little school, where heart and mind unite in the manner so eloquently described by the poet Robert Frost, "as my two eyes make one in sight."

Message From the Board

Introducing Board Chairman-Elect, Curtis Miner. At the August 2010 meeting of the American Heritage School Board of Trustees, Mrs. Laurie Swim, whose term as Chairman and Trustee expires at the end of this school year, encouraged the Board to nominate a Chairman-Elect who could spend the year serving alongside Mrs. Swim in anticipation of the leadership transition in 2011/2012. The Board unanimously elected Curtis Miner to succeed Mrs. Swim beginning

with the 2011/2012 school year, and to serve as Chair-Elect for the remainder of the current year.

"I will be ending my term at the end of this year, and my heart is tender," said Mrs. Swim. "I believe in term limits. My heart will be here. Mr. Miner, who served as the architect for American Heritage School's initial construction and its

expansion, has been a Trustee of the school since 2007. He and his wife, Janine, have four children (all at the school) and have been members of the school community for a decade.

"Curtis is as loyal and committed to the mission of the school as any of our board members," said Mrs. Swim, "and he is an individual who has the respect of all who know him. His professionalism, sincere humility, his integrity, and most of all, his goodness of heart are what make him such a fine leader."

Students will be working with the local LDS branch and the municipality to lay cement floors (with mixers this time!), teach hygiene classes, finance and business classes, and participate in firesides and youth activities with members of the Church. Given the poverty level and living conditions of families in Querétaro, students will not be staying in the homes of members. Students will stay either at a ranch home or a hotel owned by a member of the Church. The experience will also include recreation, including

sight-seeing, hiking along a beautiful river, and exploring waterfalls.

England/Scotland 2011. We are still actively planning for our "Reformation Tour 2011" to England and Scotland, which will include Christian Reformation Era and early Church History sights, among others. Estimated cost will be \$3500/person for an 8-10 day itinerary. We will announce details in November. Stay tuned!

AHS Distance Education Program Expanding Rapidly, Blessing Lives

In August, American Heritage School launched approximately 50 distance education courses that have received almost 400 course enrollments. We now have students all over UT and in AL, AZ, CA, ID, IN, KS, LA, PA, TX, VA, WA, and Canada! And the list is growing.

The most popular courses have been our history courses, including the US Constitution, Studies in Church History, World History from 1600 to Present (10th Grade). Kindergarten Language has also enrolled more students than anticipated. So far, students and parents have reported great satisfaction with these courses.

The Kindergarten Language course has produced exceptional results for pre-K and early elementary school age children. Developed with the curricular expertise of Mrs. Linda Strong, who has taught at AHS for over 20 years, this course provides students and their parents with dozens of hours of online video-instruction spread over a 30-week schedule. Each lesson is segmented into a 10 to 20 minute daily video which is also coupled with a detailed workbook. writing paper, materials, and flash cards that help the child work individually or with the assistance of a parent. These lessons guide help the child in learning how to form letters, all of their sounds, reading, and spelling. The course, which costs only \$220, also offers direct interaction with Mrs. Strong who will provide feedback regarding student writing samples and help parents answer questions as they arise. Parents are beaming over the results they are seeing with their child and with their own increased understanding of how to teach writing, reading, and spelling to their children.

Another fantastic course has been the "World History from 1600" course. In addition to rich online resources, every student receives wonderful books of primary source readings, PowerPoint slides, quizzes, essay instructions, and personal tutorials with Mr. Gentile. Accreditation Overview

In a recent phone conversation, a gentleman from another state expressed amazement that a school with a faith-based mission-statement such as American Heritage School's had become accredited and received transferability to public schools—a milestone which became effective for the 2009-10 school year. Though very pleased by this, he wondered how a school with a faith-based mission statement could receive regional and national accreditation. I responded that American Heritage School's Mission Statement has been and will continue to be fundamental to the AHS Accreditation process. I recounted a brief history of AHS's accreditation process, repeated and elaborated here:

In 2007, AHS became a candidate for accreditation through the Pacific Northwest Association of Independent Schools (PNAIS). Prior to this, Principal Grant Beckwith and the Board of Trustees determined that PNAIS was the preferable accreditation option in that AHS would be evaluated for (1) alignment of classroom practices with the School's mission statement and (2) the School's implementation of good practices commonly found in bona-fide educational institutions.

Alignment of Practices with AHS Mission Statement

The PNAIS accreditation process is heavily focused on the question "Does the school deliver what its mission statement says it delivers?" Even prior to becoming a candidate for PNAIS accreditation in 2007, American Heritage School's Board and Administration have focused on, and been guided by, the school's mission statement. In 2007, the Board put in place a 20-year Strategic Plan, including a "Statement of Core Strategic Vision" and an official motto that crystalize the School's mission statement and strategic plan into short and carefully worded phrases:

By 2027, American Heritage School will be an effective educational resource for parents worldwide in assisting children and families to maximize their divine potential (Vision Statement), and "Educating Hearts & Minds" (Motto). Although the AHS Board adopted the motto and statement of core strategic vision, it unanimously decided to retain its mission statement unmodified, including its seven aims as follows:

American Heritage School exists for the purpose of serving parents in assisting in developing the minds, the hearts, and the bodies of students in order that they may:

- 1. Be useful in the hands of the Lord in building the kingdom of God on earth;
- 2. Increase faith in and knowledge of the Plan of Salvation;
- 3. Develop a love, understanding and appreciation for America and the founding fathers;
- 4. Develop the basic academic knowledge and skills necessary to be able to make selfeducation a life- long pursuit;
- 5. Learn to reason and discern between right and wrong, truth and error;
- 6. Develop character and self-discipline of mind and body; and
- 7. Conduct themselves in all aspects of life as Christians.

All activities, teaching, governance, and administration are to be accomplished in light of the above objectives and in so far as possible in harmony with revealed principles of the restored gospel of Jesus Christ and laws of the land.

All teachers, staff, administrators, and trustees shall strive to be living examples of the values, principles, and skills taught at the school. (AHS Mission Statement)

Accreditation "Major Standards and Good Practices"

The visiting accreditation team will also want to ensure that AHS operates according to PNAIS "Major Standards and Good Practices." A copy of these standards and practices is available for review on the AHS Edline Site or at the following link:

To demonstrate AHS's implementation of good practices, AHS has been going through a reflective "Self Study" process through which board members, administrators, teachers, parents, and students discuss and write answers to hundreds of questions about every aspect of the school from classroom curriculum, to finance, to health and safety, to administration. The process results in school-wide improvement and a written Self Study document.

AHS has studied accreditation questions through focus groups, teacher in-service, and collaboration times (used regularly for curriculum mapping, analysis, and refinement), administrative meetings, and parent meetings. Moreover, the AHS Board of Trustees has allocated significant meeting time to discuss self-study questions, especially questions related to institutional leadership. Board-level committees and sub-committees meetings have also met to develop and refine the short- and long-term plans of the school.

Conclusion

After many years of preparing, we are now ready to host a full-team visit by peer school administrators, teachers, parents, and board members. A September 2010 visit from peer school heads, Nate McClennen and George Edwards (who will serve as Team Chair and Vice-Chair, respectively), confirmed that AHS is ready for a full-team visit. The four-day Accreditation Team Visit will be hosted at American

Heritage School on February 8-11 and, although no definitive representations can be made, the visit is expected to result in dual accreditation with both PNAIS and NWAC.

Thank you to so many in the school community who have been involved in the accreditation process. We are confident in the successful outcome in February 2011 and, more importantly, the rigorous self-study process has been a great blessing to the quality of our programs, operations, and offerings!

College Preparation and Academic Counseling

This year, all juniors and seniors at American Heritage School should take the ACT or SAT college admissions tests. Juniors should register to take the ACT administered on April 9, 2011. Seniors may also take (or re-take) these tests before college admission deadlines which begin in December 2010 and continue through March 2011, depending on the

institution. Juniors and seniors should review the ACT and SAT registration deadlines as shown below. See attached flyer for more details.

In preparation for the ACT, American Heritage School is partnering with "Kaplan At School" to provide three ACT preparation options:

First, on Saturday, November 13, 2011 from 8:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m., all American Heritage School high school students are invited to participate in a practice ACT in the AHS Lecture Hall. This practice test will provide an authentic setting and diagnostic feedback for students.

Second, interested students may pay \$499 (not included in AHS tuition) to participate in a Kaplan test preparation series that will be held at AHS in February and March of 2011 (see attached flyer for details).

Third, as a result our participation in the "Kaplan At School" program for paid participants, <u>all</u> AHS students in grades 9-12 (regardless of participation with Kaplan test preparation) will also be provided with free Kaplan online resources, including two full-length ACT tests and hours of video instruction on test preparation and test taking hints. To access these materials students must go to our BrainHoney website (http://american-Heritage.Brainhoney.com) and use the following login information:

Students may change their password by clicking on their name in the screen's upper right hand corner.

Additionally, Assistant Principal Leland Anderson will provide two workshops for all AHS students, focused on the new writing section of the ACT, which is now required by BYU and many other universities. These two sessions (free) will be held on November 11 and 12 from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. in the Lecture Hall.

Finally, academic counseling sessions for all students in grades 9-12 will start soon. Appointments will be scheduled for all students and their parents to meet with Mr. Hunsaker to discuss post-secondary education and career options, study goals,

standardized test results, interest surveys, college admissions, and scholarships. Eleventh and twelfth grade students will be scheduled during November and December, and ninth and tenth grade students will be scheduled in March and April. Don't miss your appointment; these are very valuable opportunities to have your questions answered or clarified!

Accelerated Math Program for Elementary School Students

Did you know that there is an Accelerated Math Program in elementary school at AHS? We take three main approaches to helping math students stay at the threshold of their math ability. The first option offers the opportunity of advancing students to the next grade level of math from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. during math hour each day. The second option provides parents with the opportunity to serve as a mentor at home with students moving ahead at a selfdirected pace. The third option is an opportunity to learn from the Saxon Dive program with computer generated instructional lessons. In all cases, the AHS math teachers stay involved, and the student has the opportunity to develop academically at a pace that suits them. We have many students in elementary school that are currently taking advantage of one or more of these options. 



The American College Test (ACT) and the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) are the two standardized entrance examinations required by most universities and colleges.

BYU and many other universities use a student's highest ACT or SAT score to determine admission and scholarship decisions no matter how many times the student took the test. Therefore, it may be advantageous for some students to take the ACT or SAT multiple times. In fact, approximately 60% of students who take these tests multiple times improve their score significantly.

In preparation for any standardized test, please remember to sleep early the night before, eat a healthful breakfast, and arrive early and prepared with proof of ID, No.2 pencils, and appropriate calculators (available online at websites shown below).
